You can also specify certain pages that can explicitly be given different access rights than that of other pages. For example.

```
<configuration>

  <system.web>
    ~~All the default settings in the web.config file...~~
  </system.web>

  <location path="register.aspx">
    <system.web>
      <authorization>
        <allow users="*" />
      </authorization>
    </system.web>
  </location>
</configuration>
```

This will allow everyone to access the registration page regardless if they have been authenticated or not. Just make sure to notice that they are NOT within the <system.web> tag that is in the web.config file by default, outside of it.
