To add on to the other responses, the MSMQ warning messages you get from the SQL Server Service Manager are the same ones you get from the Windows MMC service manager or the command-line NET STOP command. These commands and tools examine service dependencies and warn you accordingly. The warnings are normal whenever a service dependencies exist.

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Hope this helps.

I thought Roger answered that quite well.

I specified the most relevant areas in which the answer was either not provided or was not clear. Most important of all is the question of whether it is normal to get the question asking about MSMQ and MSMQTriggers.

MSMQ is not installed with SQL Server.

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Okay, thank you. Do you know why the SQL Server Service Manager is asking about MSMQ and MSMQTriggers? Most important of all, though, is the question of whether this is normal.

They are two different applications and neither is directly dependant on the other.

Note that you contradict yourself later in this message. The reason I say that MSMQ and MSMQTriggers are dependent on MSDTC is because the message from the SQL Server Service Manager says so.

The term MSMQ Triggers seems to be misleading you to believe that means there are triggers in SQL Serve which is not the case.

No the reason I am asking about MSMQ Triggers is because the message from the SQL Server Service Manager.

It is normal for SQL Server to use MSDTC when it is involved in distributed transactions. But as Roger pointed out this is not dependant on SQL Server or MSMQ.

Huh? I don't understand how that is relevant. Are you saying that SQL Server is not dependent on SQL Server? I of course understand that MSDTC is not dependent on SQL Server; I don't know what I said to indicate I don't. As for whether SQL Server is dependent on MSMQ, see below.

All your message is doing is warning you that if you use SQL Server to shut down the MSDTC service it can affect other services that depend on MSDTC, in this case MSMQ.

What message? I did not say anything about a message from me.

As for the SQL Server Service Manager message, I mainly want to know if the message from the SQL Server Service Manager is normal. You could answer that question much faster than it took to post the many criticisms. In other words, you are more concerned with criticising than

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answering the question.

So in a nutshell your assumption of:

Are MSMQ  
and  
MSMQTriggers  
installed  
with SQL  
Server? I  
assume so.

is false.

So is it normal to get the message I am getting from the SQL Server Service Manager? The message implies that MSMQ and MSMQTriggers are installed and if they are installed then it is reasonable to assume that SQL Server installed them. If that assumption is incorrect, then say so. Yet the way you say it is incorrect is in a manner that emphasizes your criticisms.

If it is normal for the SQL Server Service Manager to issue the message about MSMQ and MSMQTriggers even if they are not installed, then that is what is helpful and relevant. It would be easier to say that than to say all the criticisms.
