I have a new user that will eventually be another admin on our SQL Server 200 installation. I want to give him permission to stop and Restart Scheduled jobs, yet not have permission to insert/update or delete in specific databases until he gets more experience. The only predefined server role that allows access to scheduled jobs is SystemAdministrator, but that also gives permissions everywhere to everything.

Will creating a User in each database I want to protect based on his login, and then selecting db_denydatawriter do what I want to do, or will the also selected SystemAdministrator privilege override this altogether?
