Possibly the ports used for network browsing such as port 138 UDP are being blocked to your computer. Also NBT can rely heavily on broadcasts which normally do not go past a router. It would be normal to get a credential prompt if you specify a unc path and have access to the target computer for file and print sharing such as port139/445 TCP if you have proper name resolution via NBT or dns. --- Steve
